












2023-24 Year in Review: Worst Snow Pack in a Generation











2023-24 was a mixed year for Kanata Nordic

- Rough year for weather but ongoing trail improvements, grooming capabilities and volunteer efforts meant we salvaged a lot more from *El Nino* than expected.
- Site access issues improved from last year (e.g. Corkstown LRT), but MOL's expansion require ongoing consideration at the campground early season
- The 401 tent was great and is the start of infrastructure improvements at the Equestrian site that will continue.
- Lit trail pilots at 401 Glen and 411 1-6 were successful. Will expand next winter (when MOL departs)
- Growing our internal club events and programs is key to retaining and recruiting members *Rust Removers*, *Clinics* & *Friday* nights worked; hopefully we can try *Loppets* & group ski's and more next season
- Volunteer recruitment continues to be an on-going issue



Membership Report: Kanata Nordic Community Over Time




Membership Report: Memberships By Type



Where Do Kanata Nordic Members Come From?





Good news

- Lots of new kids, new leaders and new assistants
- Continued the Wednesday NightRabbit class for JR3/4
- Many of our new participants were new families to the sport and really enjoyed the experience
- Our Fun Day with donuts was a big hit with the skiers
- Lots of happy faces on the trails







Challenges:

- Recruiting enough volunteer leaders and assistants to run the classes remains a real challenge. KN could have run more Bunny, Jackrabbit, Dynarabbit and adult LTS with more leaders.
- Magic of Lights remains an ongoing problem in the first two weeks; shifted classes to 401
- Space is a constraint (parking, trails) & we may need to consider operating extra classes at new times (Weekday evening? Weekend morning).

Teen Skate Report: Heather Boswell & David Bentley



Teen Skate is the non-competitive skate-only program for youth aged 11-16. Our training season began in November with Sunday morning hikes (6-8km) in and around the region including Gatineau Park. Wednesday PM lessons at WCP included both levels for a lesson and trail ski.

Teen Skate 1 - beginners and progression from JR4

- 12 students, Sunday AM at WCP, Jan 7th for 10 weeks

Teen Skate 2 - intermediate level

- 9 students – 6 returning, 3 new to Club or program. Sunday mornings at WCP or Gatineau Park, Jan. 7th for 10 weeks

Despite thin snow, conditions were excellent for skate skiing. Lesson 1 was a hike and lessons 2-9 were on snow (similar to a regular year).

New Last Winter- Could not offer Teen Skate 3 (advanced) due to lack of volunteer instructor.

TS1 had a new assistant, enabling enrolment to grow to 12 from 8







Youth commitment and skill improve every year.

Looking forward

- Teen Skate continues to attract a mix of new skiers and returning members. We hope to continue our participation in next year's Fun Races.
- Additional instructors/assistants would enable us to expand the program at all levels.

Thoughts for the future:

- Need on-site familiarization session in the fall before classes for leaders and families
- Recruit volunteers earlier
 - Need to offer coaching classes (e.g., CC, L2T) on-site at Kanata Nordic in the fall/early winter before classes; bringing back the Coach the Coaches sessions and possibly Nakkertrak for Coach the Coaches;
- Offer a DynaRabbit #2 class for returning Dyna's
- Early season Rust Remover "Intro to Skiing" and "Skate 101" one-time clinics were well-received and filled up very quickly. We will repeat and hopefully expand.
- Adult classes went well but ongoing high demand for private, semi-private and family lessons
- We're missing a number of Program Offerings e.g. late-entry skiing for teens, adult LTS, masters training, 'women on skis' – but at the moment, programs are the sum of what volunteers want to do. If you would like to launch a new program at KNSC, please reach out to the board!










Kanata Nordic 2023-24 Racing Update











As a result of this program, has your sport participation increased?





Ottawa West Winter Trail (OWWT/SHOO) 2023-'24 Update






- Continues to be a great expansion of the club trails, and financially self-supporting
- When all trails are open we have 21km of free community multi-use winter groomed trails!
- No major changes of the OWWT trail network this year, but trails north of Carling and south of Corkstown to Bells Corners were groomed more frequently and were quite popular
- Due to a bridge installation on the bike path east of Moodie LRT, we were unable to groom to Carling, but we had an arrangement with BWT to occasionally groom those sections. (Still the requirement to walk on Corkstown for 500m impacted the ability to ski all the way to BWT and Kichi Sibi.)

Ottawa West Winter Trail 2023-'24 Update



- Quality of flat asphalt/stone-dust base trails early in the season. This gives members a place to ski before the other trails are ready
- Longer ski trips are possible by combining the OWWT with Club Trails.
- The newer North/South legs up to the river and down to Bells Corners (Kichesippi Beer) received more attention this year
- The OWWT increases visibility in the neighbouring communities, introduces newer skiers to xc skiing and can provide a gateway to club membership
- The DND Loop was slightly increased in distance with the grooming up to the Wildlife Centre, although more frequent grooming of the DND area is required in future
- Distance of trail network requires a larger KN/OWWT grooming team and additional equipment
- The club purchased a Happy Trails Groomer with electrically activated wheels which was used successfully on the OWWT and functioned well for road-crossings




Ottawa West Winter Trail Update




- Excellent support by new assistant coordinator, Tom Duxbury, and all the OWWT volunteers
- Volunteer teams created to shovel all major intersections, tunnels, etc...
- User condition reports on Social Media continue to be well received, in conjunction with the use of Nordic Pulse for grooming conditions on the OWWT
- OWWT was financially "profitable" and self-supporting, although it should be understood that there are significant costs involved in grooming an extra 21km of trails.
- Excellent funding this year from:
 - United Way Community Services Recovery Fund Grant (\$40K) & Trans Canada Trail Grant (\$1.2K)
 - UWTA (City of Ottawa, NCC) (\$18K)
 - Go Fund Me (\$7.8K) & Sponsors (\$2.5K)
- Funds used to cover grooming costs, equipment maintenance, and to purchase additional equipment needed to groom the OWWT.
- Focus next year will be to investigate parking options, hold some social events, further improve branding & signage, improve the DND Loop, possibly to incorporate Trail 10 North of Carling, and increase private sponsorship \$\$
- More volunteers are needed to support the various OWWT activities planning/coordination, trail prep, social media, translation, events, and fund-raising








Kanata Nordic Length of Season

Unprecedented warm weather and lack of snow. First grooming Dec 5th, followed by a thaw, resuming early January


Final grooming Feb 25th. The site was closed Feb 27, a full month earlier than previous years.







- Grooming occurred at least 4 x per week and more during/after snowfall events
- 20 regular weekly groomers, each taking one or more shifts per week, and several fill-in groomers
- New trail 105 at Equestrian
- Existing trail network improvements / maintenance for safer grooming and trail quality (e.g. wood chips, culverts, etc.)
- Ongoing snowshoe network development



Trails Report: Equipment



New purchases

- BRP Outlander XT 1000, replacing old one
- New (to us) Skidoo Skandic
- New Happy Trails groomer with robust wheel kit for road crossings
- New super wide roller.

Current Fleet

- 2 BRP Outlander XT1000 and three Ski-doo Skandic snowmobiles,
- Kubota Mueller Tractor groomer in addition to our 5 grooming implements and three snow rollers







2024 AGM Motion: Expenditure Over \$10,000

Acquisition of purpose-built 8-way trail grooming front blade for Kubota Tractor



Motion: Expenditure over \$10K

"The motion proposes an expenditure with a budget up to \$45,000 for the purchase of a purpose-built 8-way trail grooming front blade for our existing Kubota tractor in order to improve trail grooming capabilities in varied conditions, improve the Kubota's grooming efficiency, and facilitate snow movement. The decision regarding the make and model will be researched and a recommendation made by a committee reporting to the Trails coordinator. The final approval of the purchase will be made by the sitting Kanata Nordic Executive."




Why? KNSC is facing more complicated trail grooming conditions

Problems:

- Increasing frequency of challenging snow conditions (thaw/freeze cycles yielding icy crud hardpack)
- Increasing frequency of challenging snow conditions which require snow movement (thin snowpack after MoL departure; significant snow loss before a race or weekend event)
- Trail situations requiring increasing grooming operational time and cost (additional passes to mitigate off-camber and/or tight turns).







What? Replace current 4-way snow pusher front blade of Kubota/Mueller with a purpose-built 8-way trail grooming front blade.

Cost: Approximately \$45,000

Benefits:

- Additional planes of adjustment allow blade to re-shape trail to a more level condition, i.e., correct off-camber sections (e.g. trail 12, 107). This adjustment capability improves grooming efficiency and requires fewer grooming passes.
- Angled wings allow for harvesting snow from off-trail areas with less spillage when pushing onto trail, compared to current straight blade (e.g. using at camp sites at 411 like 3 & 6; off-trail at 401)
- Aggressive, hardened "teeth" along lower edge of blade allow for more effective preprocessing of hard icy snowpack and especially iced trackset, requiring less tilling force / depth, therefore faster grooming speeds.

2024 AGM Motion: Cost Analysis

A recent quote (attached) from Mountain Grooming: \$25k USD = \$33,750 CAD

Customization labour, tax, customs, any applicable duties estimate = \$11,250 CAD

Total: Up to \$45,000 CAD


